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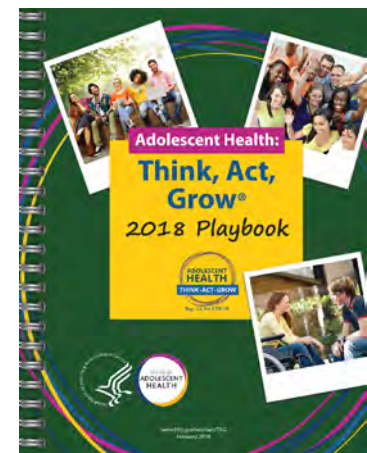
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Office of Adolescent Health Recognizes County's Birth to 22 Initiative

On May 12, Future Leaders United for Change hosted its first leadership conference at Palm Beach Lakes High School in West Palm Beach. More than 215 youth from across Palm Beach County attended the Future Leaders: 2018 Leadership Conference, with welcoming remarks from Palm Beach County Vice Mayor Mack Bernard.

The conference's themes were leadership, healthy coping mechanisms, social media, life skills and equity. Invited speakers included Ricky Aiken, the keynote speaker and Inner City Innovators executive director; Hazeller Decime, director of For the Children Youth Empowerment Center; Youth Services Department Director Tammy K. Fields; and David Wooten, Boys and Girls Club Youth of the Year.

"A conference like this, planned by youth for youth, is so important," said Fields. "They shared their personal stories in order to help others. We learned what was important to our youth, and I believe the youth came away feeling listened to and empowered."

Attendees enjoyed a skit about the value in using social media platforms to uplift our community performed by the Palm Beach Lakes High School drama team. The performance also introduced topics presented in the conference's workshop sessions "An Innovative Guide to EmPOWERment: Social Media, Healthy Coping Mechanisms" and "Life SKILLS & LEADERSHIP."

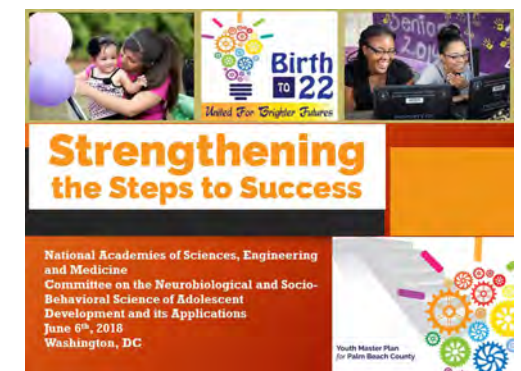

Youth Services Director Presents at NASEM Conference in Washington

Tammy K. Fields, director of the Palm Beach County Youth Services Department, was invited to speak at the National Academies of Sciences, Engineering and Medicine (NASEM) Conference on June 6, in Washington D.C. Tammy's presentation to the Committee on the Neurobiological and Socio-Behavioral Science of Adolescent Development and its Applications dealt with the power of collaborations in addressing adolescent needs.

The committee is charged with examining the neurobiological and socio-behavioral science of adolescent development, health, well-being and resilience, including the science of positive youth development. The group also focuses on how this knowledge can be applied to institutions and systems so that adolescent well-being, resilience and development are promoted and that systems address structural barriers and inequalities in opportunity and access.



The committee learned of the collaborative work being done by Birth to 22: United for Brighter Futures and wanted to know more about how this work can be scaled to other communities as a best practice model. Palm Beach County was the only county government invited to present at this meeting.

Tammy K. Fields, Youth Services Department director, and Lisa Williams-Taylor, Children’s Services Council of Palm Beach County CEO, gave a presentation on the Birth to 22 initiative that focused on mental and behavioral health supports for Palm Beach County children.

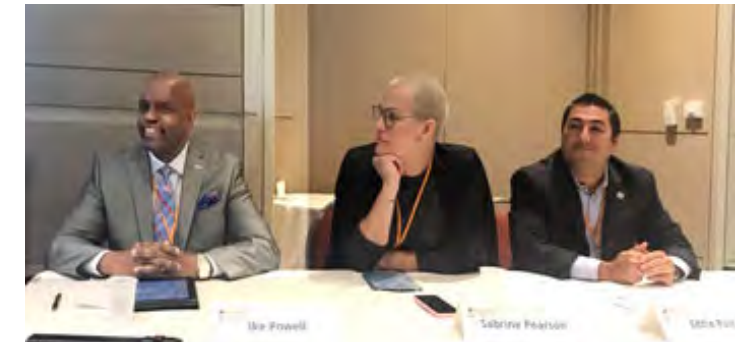

The Palm Beach County Youth Services Department, in partnership with Healthier Delray Beach and Birth to 22: United for Brighter Futures, launched the "Get Your Green On" campaign and invited Palm Beach County to wear green on May 24 in solidarity. The Board of County Commissioners also presented a proclamation declaring May 2018 Mental Health Awareness and Trauma Informed Care Month in Palm Beach County.

The Youth Services Department's Education & Training Center and Risk Management's Employee Assistance Program (EAP) held four Lunch & Learn sessions. These events offered presentations on topics such as "Myths of Mental Health," presented by Dr. Melissa Singh; "Chill Out!: Effective Relaxation Techniques," presented by Dr. Laura Cruz; "What's Important?: Understanding Your Values to Enrich Your Life," presented by Dr. Loren Berry; and "Self-Care: Taking Care of Yourself Takes Care of Everything Else," presented by Ashley Wilkins, MA.

As part of the campaign, Dr. Marcy Weiss and Dr. Laura Cruz wrote articles about mental health counseling, intervention, assertive communication and healthy relationships. Dr. Weiss and Dr. Shayna Ginsburg also participated in an interview with Channel 20 about mental health awareness and trauma-informed care. Youth Services Department Secretary Giselle Badillo created a Mental Health Awareness Month calendar with wellness tips.

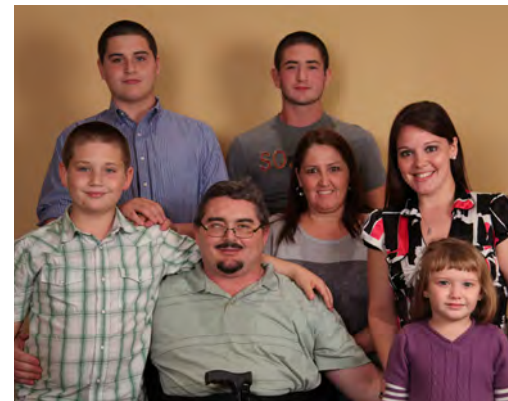
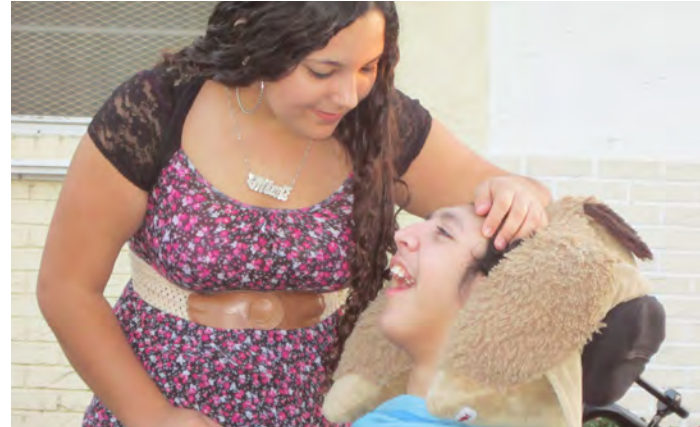
Books Donated to Summer BreakSpot Sites



The Children's Services Council of Palm Beach County donated 12,000 books (appropriate for students pre-k through 5th grade) to give away at the Summer BreakSpot sites this summer. United Way of Palm Beach County coordinated volunteers to sort and organize the books. All books will be distributed through My Free Libraries and Summer Break Spots throughout the county in partnership with The School District of Palm Beach County and Palm Beach County Youth Services Department.

The Youth Services Department's Summer Food Service Program team picked up 80 boxes of books. Summer Food Monitors went to the Palm Beach County School Food Service building to pick up the boxes. The books were then distributed to Summer BreakSpot site across the County, from Jupiter to Boca Raton, and the Glades.

CBA Spotlight: American Association of Caregiving Youth



1. What is your mission?

To increase awareness and provide support services for youth caregivers and their families by connecting them with healthcare, education and community resources.

2. What does your organization do?

The Caregiving Youth Project (CYP) of the American Association of Caregiving Youth identifies students in grades 6-12 who care for someone in their family who is chronically ill, injured, disabled, or elderly. Often these students are the main caregivers in the home. These students may be bathing, feeding, providing medications, and cooking for their care receiver, just to name a few of their responsibilities. The CYP works in partnership with The School District of Palm Beach County to help support these youth in their caregiving roles, as well as strengthen their families to reduce the stress on the youth.

3. What key programs does your organization offer?

The CYP breaks through the external barriers of learning with direct services:

In School -- youth learn they are no longer alone through Skills Building groups, and Lunch and Learn sessions;

At Home -- assessing family needs and linking them with resources through many collaborating partners, including providing computers, tutoring, respite and special projects;

Out of School -- time for a break from caregiving and experiencing an overnight camp, picnics, mentor matches and other educational and fun activities.

4. How does your agency benefit the community?

The CYP is the only program in the County that specifically addresses this otherwise large yet hidden population of youth. Its holistic and integrated services strengthen students, families, schools and communities. With CYP support, students progress to the next grade and >97% graduate high school with most going on the post-secondary education. Each time a child graduates, both the child and society benefit.

Typically, youth enroll in the CYP from 6th grade and continue through high school, if they continue caregiving. Enrollment is rolling, and services continue throughout the calendar year. The average length of time in the CYP is 5.46 years.

Caregiving youth report that CYP has helped them with grades, confidence, skills, family life, communication and managing anger and stress.

5. What is your agency's focus for 2018?

The focus for 2018 is to continue to raise awareness about this population and the impact of family health conditions on the whole family and society within the County, State and nation. There are more caregiving youth than there are in foster care or those who are homeless. The growth of the CYP and its services are

needed throughout the County; it is only limited by resources. As an organization, there is the ongoing development of the Caregiving Youth Institute, the Caregiving Youth Research Collaborative with professionals from nine universities across the US and a growing Affiliate Network.

6. How do the funds received from Palm Beach County enhance the services your agency provides?

Funds from Palm Beach County have allowed CYP services to spread to two additional schools servicing

many more youth caregivers. With these funds we are able to identify youth caregivers beginning with 6th graders and provide support services in two new Title I middle schools - LC Swain and Conniston. This year, in addition to those students already enrolled, there will be new ones from the new 6th grade classes.

Meet Pedro

Caregiving Youth Project (CYP) Family Specialist Monica Bernal was approached during her Lunch and Learn at Conniston Middle School by a 6th grade student name Pedro. Pedro told Ms. Monica that he was caring for his mom who is in a wheel chair. They spoke further, and he let her know that he was interested in joining the CYP. After lunch Ms. Monica met with Pedro for an initial intake to talk about his responsibilities as a youth caregiver and to make sure he would be eligible to enroll in the program. Pedro said he helped his mom with eating, getting dressed, moving from one place to another, scheduling appointments, translating, providing emotional support, cleaning, doing laundry, and keeping her company. So many responsibilities for a sixth-grade boy!

Pedro showed that he was an exceptional young man and would be a perfect candidate for the CYP! Right after school Ms. Monica called Pedro's mom and scheduled a home visit to learn a little more about the family and how the CYP may be able to help them with

some new resources. Mom agreed to the visit.

At the time of the home visit, Ms. Monica learned that Pedro's mom really needed a new wheel chair, medical support and respite assistance. As expected, she also found out that Pedro needed some academic support including tutoring as well as emotional support and help caring for mom.

He knows he can't change his mom's health condition(s) however he is better able to manage his journey with a positive outlook in his life.

YSD's [Summer Food Service Program](#) (SFSP) currently has 88 open sites in Palm Beach County, from Boca Raton to Jupiter and the Glades. Since 2013, SFSP has served 1,144,644 meals. In 2017 alone, SFSP served 222,037 meals.

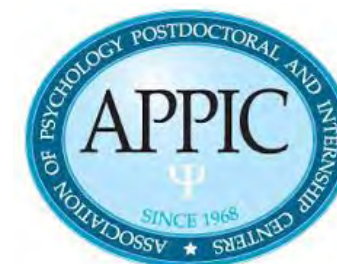

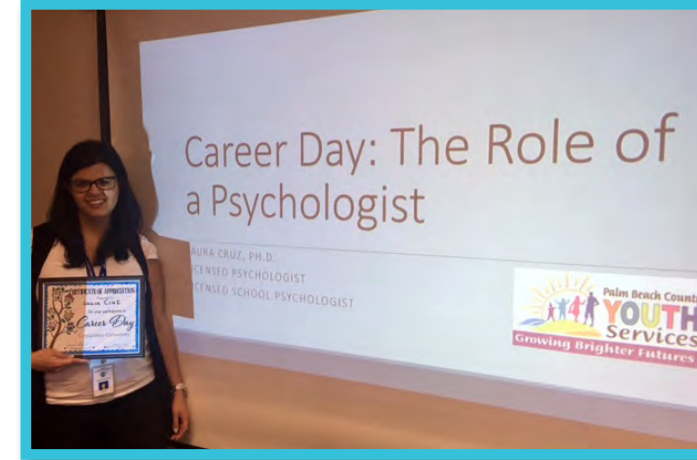
the training of doctoral and postdoctoral psychologists as well as the working with the National Match Program that places psychology doctoral students in internships.

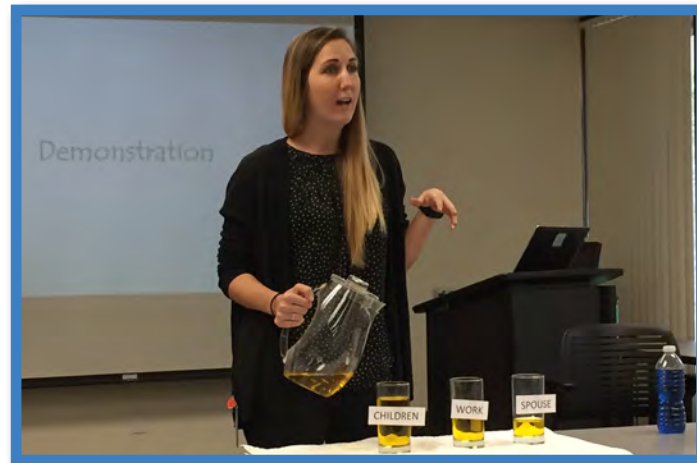
